
Welcome to the first edition of the Mackenzie Basin Catchment Collective Newsletter!

### What's been happening?

OHAU DOWNS STATION - FARM OPEN DAY SUCCESS!

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> of March we held our first farm open day at Ohau Downs Station, and wow what a day! Kees and Kathryn opened their gates to share their operations and some of their Lake Ohau Wagyu (which we can confirm, was very well received). Here are a few words from Kathryn herself.

The Mackenzie Basin Catchment Collective asked if we would host an Open Farm Day here at Ohau Downs Station in conjunction with MBCC and Landcare Trust. To be honest we were a little apprehensive and weren't sure what to expect on the day. Well, it could not have been better. Approximately 100 people of all ages and backgrounds came to visit to see a little of what we do here on farm. We split the afternoon into blocks hoping this would be interesting.

A chat about our on-farm nursery was followed by Kees talking about our Wagyu operation and how the Lake Ohau Wagyu brand came about. The positive feedback we have had from the public, chefs, butchers and how the demand outstripped our expectation.

Of course, the proof of anything is in sampling the product, so we cooked up a few steaks for everyone to try – it was all eaten.

Then our visitors went along to the Raupo Lagoon QEII Covenant Block. A huge thanks to Haeleigh Turner (Wilding Free Mackenzie) and Cathy and Aalbert (QEII) for sharing their knowledge and expertise. They explained the significance of the area, why we need to protect it and allowed everyone to wonder to a few locations to appreciate the size of the lagoon and experience the rawness of this wilderness, which incorporates both drylands and wetlands (tarns, kettle holes).



So many people later expressed how much they appreciated the opportunity to understand more about our QEII and why it is so special. Once everyone returned a Q&A session was held in the woolshed, along with a hot drinks and cake.

We have always appreciated that we farm in a special place and that our farming operation, the environment and guardianship go hand in hand. We work closely with QEII, Environment Canterbury, MPI, DOC, Wilding Free Mackenzie, Runanga, Meridian on many projects, as neighbors and stakeholders within North Otago and the Mackenzie Basin. We respect and like to foster good working relationships with them.So our Open Farm Day and the Q&A panel included representatives from each of these groups.

Wes, spoke of his work with Tuna (eel) in Lake Ohau. We always appreciate his passion and knowledge, and it was fantastic that he could share this with our visitors on the day.

Marianne (DOC) brought along the most brilliant display of pests, information and games. People don't always have the opportunity to see a ferret, possum or other pests in their actual state and size so this was a wonderful and thoughtful addition. Tracey Perkins from Landcare Trust facilitated the whole day – she was a



gem directing the day and keeping us on track.

We finished the day with Lake Ohau Wagyu on the spit along with a BBQ thanks to Logan from Ohau Lodge and those on the tools.

Kees and I tried to meet and chat to as many people as we could. We thoroughly enjoyed sharing the 'what and why' of what it is we do here at Ohau Downs Station.

## Catchment Group Projects

#### WAIREPO ARM RESTORATION PROJECT

In a stride towards environmental conservation, the Wairepo Arm Catchment Group has successfully secured funding and necessary consents to embark on an ambitious project aimed at restoring the flow of Wairepo Creek.

The project, which received the green light to commence in March and April, involves the removal of willows and other invasive vegetation that have been choking the creek.

The MBCC and Mt Cook Alpine Salmon have supported this project by collecting water quality and velocity samples to monitor any potential changes to the arm as a result of the project.

A final project summary reviewing all the moving parts is still to be completed. Stay tuned!
